




















### **Festival Welcome**

Reimagining is at the heart of this year's Manchester Literature Festival. Caroline Lucas asks us to reimagine a greener, more inclusive England. 






Lindsey Hilsum Sunday 6 October 2024, 4.30pm Central Library




**Ekow Eshun** Sunday 13 October, 3pm International Anthony Burgess Foundation




**Harriet Walter** Saturday 19 October 2024, 7.30pm HOME




Lord of the Flies with Aimee de Jongh Saturday 12 October 2024, 5pm Central Library
