


An Evening with Rebecca F. Kuang Friday 22 August 2025, 7.30pm Aviva Studios



Led By Donkeys was founded in early 2019 with late-night billboards quoting leading Brexiters' historic tweets. 


Alice Vincent Tuesday 14 October 2025, 7pm Central Library
